- Matthew 7:1-2 (KJV) "Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again."
- **John 7:24 (KJV)** "Judge not according to the appearance, but judge righteous judgment."

Failing to discern the body of Christ often involves making harsh judgments without *knowledge or relationship*. This includes:

- Speculating about someone's character without ever speaking to them.
- Assuming the worst about others based on rumors or outward appearances.
- Labeling people without investigation or without applying biblical principles like confronting a brother or sister privately (Matthew 18:15).

- **Proverbs 6:16-19 (KJV)** "These six things doth the Lord hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto him: ... a false witness that speaketh lies, and he that soweth discord among brethren."
